Dr. Risa Brooks is Allis-Chalmers Professor of Political Science at Marquette University, Wisconsin, USA, a non-resident fellow in the Future Security program at New America and non-resident Senior Associate at the Center for Strategic and International Studies.

She is the author of Shaping Strategy: The Civil-Military Politics of Strategic Assessment (Princeton University Press), coeditor (with Elizabeth Stanley) of Creating Military Power: The Sources of Military Effectiveness (Stanford University Press), and coeditor (with Lionel Beehner and Daniel Maurer) of Reconsidering American Civil-Military Relations: Politics, Society and Modern War (Oxford University Press).

Her research and commentaries have appeared in publications such as Foreign Affairs, The Washington Post, The New York Times and in numerous academic journals. Brooks received her Ph.D. from the University of California, San Diego, and formerly held positions as research associate at the International Institute for Strategic Studies in London, U.K. and postdoctoral fellow at Stanford's Center for International Security and Cooperation. Her primary research interests include U.S. and comparative civil-military relations, strategic assessment and military professionalism.

Mr Anderson was awarded the Public Service Medal for his role in leading the humanitarian and consular response to the 2009 Pacific tsunami. Head of National Security College, Australian National University



Professor Rory Medcalf AM is Head of the National Security College at The Australian National University.

Professor Sir Hew Strachan, CVO, FBA, FRSE

Professor of International Relations, University of St Andrews



Sir Hew Strachan, CVO, FBA, FRSE, has been Wardlaw Professor of International Relations at the University of St Andrews since 2015.

He is a Life Fellow of Corpus Christi College, Cambridge and an Emeritus Fellow of All Souls College, Oxford. He was Professor of Modern History at Glasgow University 1992 to 2001, and Chichele Professor of the History of War at Oxford 2002 to 2015. He served on the national committees for the centenary of the First World War of the United Kingdom, Scotland and France. He has been a specialist adviser to the UK's Joint Parliamentary Committee on the National Security Strategy 2011-24; a member of the Strategic Advisory Panel of the UK Chief of Defence Staff; and a Visiting Professor at the Royal Norwegian Air Force Academy 2000-24.

His publications include The First World War: To Arms (2001); The First World War: a New Illustrated History (2003; based on his 10-part series for Channel 4); Clausewitz's On War 2007); and The Direction of War (2013).

Professor Sir Lawrence Freedman, KCMG

Emeritus Professor of War Studies, King's College London



Sir Lawrence Freedman is Emeritus Professor of War Studies, King's College London, where he was Professor of War Studies from 1982 to 2014 and Vice-Principal from 2003 to 2013.

He was educated at Whitley Bay Grammar School and the universities of Manchester, York and Oxford. He previously held research appointments at the IISS, Nuffield College Oxford and Chatham House. Elected a Fellow of the British Academy in 1995, he was appointed Official Historian of the Falklands Campaign in 1997. In June 2009 he was appointed to serve as a member of the official inquiry into Britain's role in the 2003 Iraq War.

His most recent book is Command: the Politics of Military Operations from Korea to Ukraine. With his son, Sam, he publishes the substack is Freed.

General Sir Peter Cosgrove, AK, AC, CVO, MC (Retd)

Former Governor General of Australia



Peter Cosgrove served as the 26th Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia. He was Knighted at his swearing in 2014.

Born into a military family, Sir Peter followed in the footsteps of his father and joined the Australian Army, attending Royal Military College, Duntroon in 1965.

He was deployed to Malaysia with 1st Battalion RAR and later to Vietnam with 9th Battalion RAR where he commanded an infantry platoon, and was awarded the Military Cross (MC) for his performance and leadership during an assault on enemy positions. In 1999 he commanded the International Forces in East Timor (INTERFET) overseeing that country's transition to independence. He was Chief of Army from 2000 to 2002 and Chief of the Defence Force from 2002 to 2005.

He then retired from active duty and went on to serve on several corporate boards before becoming the Governor-General.

In retirement Sir Peter is actively involved with defence, health and other charitable organisations. He acted as Ambassador for the Department of Veteran Affairs Commemorations of Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War; Patron of the Virtual War Memorial of Australia; Patron 9 RAR Association; Patron INVICTUS Australia; Patron National Vietnam Veterans Museum among other involvements. He is an avid sports fan with a particular interest in rugby and cricket.
