The Local's Guide to Canberra

Below is some general information about Canberra and some highlights of 'beyond the bubble' things to do before or after the conference.

ABOUT CANBERRA



Weather in Canberra in September is a bit unpredictable and cold, often with frost in the mornings. Maybe you will have the most glorious spring sunshine as you stroll through the tulips at Floriade. Maybe it will sleet. Maybe both in the same afternoon.

Bring a winter jacket, no matter what the forecast says. Bring a beanie, gloves and scarf. The Conference venue is heated, so we suggest you wear layers.

Canberra is renowned for its national institutions, galleries and exhibitions, and we highly recommend experiencing some of them. For info on those, check out: https://visitcanberra.com.au

A particular highlight is Parliament House – you can enter and wander the public areas at leisure, even on sitting days, something that is rare by world standards!

Canberrans refer to the central part of the city as '**Civic**' although this is not the official name for it (being 'City' officially). The Conference is on the edge of Civic (southeast corner), near the Civic pool

Canberra is **not a grid city** so the Civic area can be difficult to navigate and estimate distance. We recommend use of maps or way finding apps.

ARRIVING AND DEPARTING CANBERRA

The **airport is about 10 minutes by taxi from the conference centre.** It's a small, efficient airport – it won't take as long to gather bags or check in and security as other airports. Most people take taxi or uber to access the airport. There is public transport (bus) available

- R3 (<u>route Rapid 3</u>) runs about every 15 minutes on weekdays and 30 minutes on weekends until about 9pm. It takes about 20 minutes from the airport to the city.
- There is a bus stop right outside the convention centre, or you can catch the bus from the City interchange. If you're going from the convention centre to the airport, you want to be on the other side of the road from the convention centre, and get the bus that says 'airport'.
- Coach terminal (e.g. Greyhound/Murrays bus) is close to the city centre and bus interchange. There is a taxi rank out the front (Northbourne Ave).

GETTING AROUND

Rail construction on London Circuit may affect direct routes and transit time between City East and City West, especially if you are driving. Accessible pedestrian routes are marked.

Transport:

Self propelled – the city centre is relatively flat, and many cafes and restaurants are all within a 10-15 min relaxed walk of the Conference venue (often faster to walk than to catch a cab). Shared e-scooters are available to be hired – watch out for these if you are walking!

Taxis – Multiple taxi companies operate.
Call to order or book, or catch from a
designated Taxi rank. Taxis are generally
hard to catch off the street.

Uber – available and is a popular option.



Public Transport – there is one public transport system (bus/light rail) and they do not take cash fares. You can tap on/off with a Visa or Mastercard, or use an app. Tickets can be purchased from select vendors, or at machines at interchanges. More info on routes and tickets here.

Private Vehicle: Canberra was designed with cars in mind, and driving in Canberra is easy. Most public institutions have plenty of parking (check signage for payment).

Use map apps to estimate driving times, and add a little extra around 9am and 5pm on weekdays.

WHERE TO EAT

An informal, group dinner option for Monday and Wednesday nights will be made available to register for in advance.

If you are staying Sunday or Monday night, please check your desired venue is open (Canberra can be quiet on these days).

There are supermarkets (Aldi and Coles) within the Canberra Centre Mall (smaller convenience stores are also around).

Close to the Convention Centre (1-5 min walk)

THINGS TO DO ('beyond the bubble')



Floriade – annual flower festival featuring artworks made from tulips planted in patterns, just across the road from the Conference at Commonwealth Park, open 9:30am to 5:30pm (free entry).

<u>Canberra Museum and</u> <u>gallery</u> – learn more about the local area, many exhibitions.

Get active

Walk or run: the iconic 'bridge to bridge' loop (5km, central basin of the lake)

Swim: <u>Canberra Olympic pool</u> is across the road from the Convention centre. Opens at 5.30 weekdays, Casual entry is \$9.00.

Cycle: We have a great network of paths, including around the lake. Some hotels have bikes you can borrow, or hire a bike (weekends only). Cycling on footpaths is permitted in Canberra, and so it can feel much safer to cycle here than in other cities.

Walks and talks

There are over 100 free self-guided bushwalks around Canberra, including the iconic Mt Ainslie summit – details here.

<u>Mulligans Flat Woodland Sanctuary</u> is Australia's largest single Box-gum Grassy-woodland area managed for conservation

<u>She Shapes History</u> - regularly scheduled walking tours about Canberra's hidden history (book early)

<u>Tim the Yowie Man</u> - ad-hoc evening tours of unique locations in Canberra (book early)

<u>Local Jinni</u> – public art inspired tours and events

Get out a bit further

Canberra is <u>cool climate wine country</u> and there are many great local wineries to visit on the weekends (need a car or book a tour)Canberra Region Committee suggests: Majura Winery (north), Capital Wines Cellar Door (north west), Canberra Wine Merchants (Civic)

Tidbinbilla Nature Reserve. While you can certainly see kangaroos close to the city (guaranteed sightings at Weston Park), Tidbinbilla offers walking trails, and a sanctuary where you can spot a variety of birds, roos, koalas and platypus in the wild. Car transport is required, and there is a vehicle entry cost (\$16)
