THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION WILL BE MOVED:

"WE, representing THE ABORIGINES OF AUSTRALIA, assembled in Conference at the Australian Hall, Sydney, on the 26th day of January, 1938, this being the 150th Anniversary of the whitemen's seiture of our country, HEREBY MAKE PROTEST against the callous treatment of our people by the whitemen during the past 150 years, AND WE APPEAL to the Australian Nalion of today to make new haws for the education and care of Abotigines, and we ask for a new policy which will raise our people to FULL CITIZEN STATUS and EQUALITY WITHIN THE COMMUNITY."

Aborigines and Persons of Aboriginal Blood only are invited to attend. Please come if you can!





Eye health equity is a priority for Mob

Eye Diseases and Vision problems are the **most common long term health conditions** reported by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people experience **3x's more vision impairment and blindness** than non-Indigenous Australians with over **>90% of vision loss is preventable** with timely intervention.

Rates of Vision loss and blindness to increase by 2030 without intervention

There will be a gap in eye health and vision care services into 2030 for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander population estimates are projected to reach 1 million

This is consistent with international findings that according to projections 50% of the world's population will be short-sighted by 2050.

The impacts are far reaching - unemployment, poor academic performance, mental ill health, social isolation, and increased risk of injury and illness.











Mob consultation told us




