1400 - 1445	Creating new pathways for indigenous knowledge and people in research <p>The New Zealand government is undertaking a significant re-set of its research system. One of the four major goals of the Te Ara Paerangi – Future Pathways reforms is to embed the aspirations of Māori - the indigenous people - into the research priorities and activities of its system. Ambitious as this is, New Zealand will not be starting from scratch. A corpus of prior experience, coupled with a number of reports from contemporary indigenous researchers point the way to a more thriving research system for all in New Zealand.
