#### Male sex work & HIV in Australia

- Sex work is not uncommon among gay and bisexual men (GBM)
  - About one in five have ever been paid for sex
  - · Only a small proportion (about 2%) have been 'professional' sex workers
  - About 5% report recent sex work
  - Most sex work is casual & opportunistic
- GBM who engage in sex work tend to be sexually adventurous,
   & therefore to also:
  - engage in high risk sexual behaviors
  - use illicit drugs, especially for chemsex
- All previous data cross-sectional

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## The Flux Study:

Prospective observational study of drug use among gay and bisexual men



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### **Retention (2014-5 cohort)**

Virtual visit	Retention (%)

12-month	71.3
18-month	54.6
24-month	58.1

By December 2017, 1395 men had provided follow-up data, & responded to questions about sex work.



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



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## Conclusion:

What does all this mean?

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#### Conclusion

- Sex work was not uncommon though most is infrequent
- About one in 20 men initiated sex work over 2 years
- Men who initiated sex work were:
  - younger & less likely to be in full-time employment
- Some men who started sex work experienced depression
  - Depression was not a distinguishing factor after commencing sex work
- They were also more sexually adventurous, & risky
- But no more likely to use PrEP
- The only things that changed after commencing sex work:
  - More partners
  - More likely to use PrEP (but no more than men who didn't do sex work)
- Male sex workers may need to be prioritised for access to PrEP.
