SMART Family and Friends

The feasibility of a video-conference delivered intervention for Australian families affected by another's methamphetamine use.

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Introduction

- Families and friends, affected by a loved one's methamphetamine use experience significant physical and mental health concerns.
- Evidence-based interventions to support families remain limited.
- This study examined the feasibility of SMART Family and Friends, a group intervention for affected families, delivered via video-conferencing.

Method

Design: Pre-post feasibility study using mixed-methods.

Setting: SMART Family and Friends groups delivered via video-conferencing.

Participants: Self-selected convenience sample recruited via the Australian SMART Recovery website (March-October 2021).


Baseline: N = 45; 1-Week follow up interview: N = 32 (71%); 1-Month follow up measures: N = 33 (73%).

Measures:


Feasibility: Attendance, participant satisfaction questionnaire, Semi-structured phone interview. **Outcomes (pre-post):** Psychological Distress (K10), Quality of Life (EUROHIS-QOL), Family Member Questionnaire (Stress, Strain, Impact, Coping).









Psychological distress Stress symptoms Family member impact



Conclusions

- Preliminary support for the feasibility of a mutualsupport intervention for affected families, delivered via videoconferencing.
- Further sufficiently powered research trials are merited to evaluate efficacy.
