





Identifying Barriers to Opioid Pharmacotherapy Delivery in Mental Health Services in Victoria

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
Introduction and Methods


- People experiencing co-occurring mental illness and substance use experience many barriers accessing opioid agonist treatment (OAT).
- Online anonymous survey to document current workforce practices for OAT provision in Victorian Area Mental Health and Wellbeing Services (AMHWBS).
- Ethics approval granted by Eastern Health Human Research Ethics Committee.




Key Findings

- 132 responses received > 103 from eligible services and sufficiently complete
- 76.7% Metropolitan AMHWBS










- 68% >5 years experience working in mental health
- 61.8% previous OAT experience
- 72.3% reported access to prescribers in their service
 - > 54.5% had capacity to meet OAT prescribing needs









Barriers

- 47% identified barriers to providing OAT in the inpatient setting
- 40% identified barriers to providing OAT in the community setting

| Barriers to OAT in the inpatient setting | Barriers to OAT in the community setting |

| Specialist access | Prescriber access /service not offered |
| Training, knowledge and experience | Referral pathways/lack of AOD support |
| Confirming doses with community providers | Training, knowledge, experience |
| Pharmacy access/delays | Medication storage |
| Stigma | Pharmacy copayment |
