Focus of session:	Approximately every 5 years since 1992, the Australian Research Centre in Sex, Health & Society at La Trobe University conducts the National Survey of Secondary Students and Adolescent Sexual Health, funded by the Commonwealth of Australia Department of Health. Survey findings inform progress on national strategies to address sexually transmissible infections, including HIV, and the

	<p>general sexual health and wellbeing of Australian adolescents.</p> <p>The 6th Survey, conducted online in 2018, engaged 6,327 year 10-12 students. Minimum quota sampling across two sets of census-based strata achieved nationally balanced coverage of 1) gender, year in school and school type (government, catholic, independent) and 2) state/territory with an oversample of low-population states/territories. The survey also achieved sizeable sub-groups of ATSI and non-heterosexual/non-cis-gender young people.</p> <p>Measures included HIV, STI and BBV knowledge, sexual behaviours (including condom use, partner communication and peer group norms), sexting and cyberbullying, information-seeking, and perceptions of sexuality and relationships education.</p> <p>The session will provide an overview of key data across the key survey domains of knowledge, behaviours and educational experiences with a focus on key aspects of the national strategies for HIV and BBVSTIs highlighting potential priority areas for improving upon the successes in addressing Australian adolescent sexual health and wellbeing. It will also include a robust policy and practice discussion lead by education, health, youth and community sector contributors</p>
