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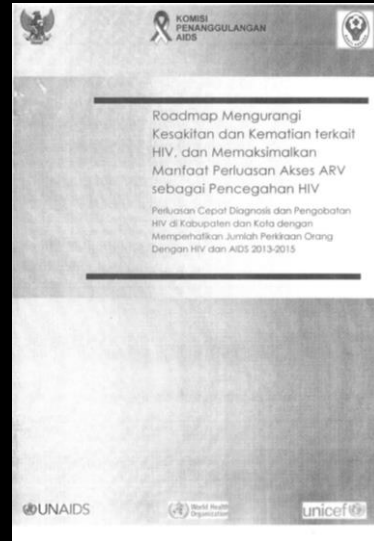

An ambitious treatment target to help end the AIDS epidemic

UNAIDS



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Setting



261 million people, 300 ethnic groups, over 700 local languages

By 2016, estimated 640,000 people living with HIV.

As of March 2018, 290,000 knew their status

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Present work: Understanding HIV care engagement in urban Indonesian HIV clinics

Context: Bandung City



- Population: 2,490,622 in an area of 167 km². In 2017: 935 HIV cases.
- Implementation of SUFA strategy since 2014, yet treatment remains in big hospital only.

Making sense of the moral context

- Counselling about health and (?) reclaiming moral responsibility

*"[They] told me **to tobat, not to be gay**. Is it their authority to speak like that as a counsellor?" (Wahyu, 20 year old, student)*

*"I guess he has the **moral responsibility** to advise me so, and I just accepted it without any anger." (Jisu, 31 yo, wedding organiser)*
