
HIV testing in **NSW**

HIV test positivity in GBM, by place of birth


Increased testing has been associated with declining test positivity







Proportion of HIV positive MSM undiagnosed, by place of birth








HIV Treatment following HIV diagnosis

Predictors of early ART in NSW 2016-2018

- Less likely to start within 2 weeks if :
 - Primary language not English
 - Diagnosed by non-S100GP
- Less likely to start <6 weeks if :
 - Diagnosed in 2016 vs 2018
 - 100,000 copies/mL vs <10,000 copies mL at diagnosis


PrEP coverage among gay and bisexual men

2019 Sydney Gay Community Periodic Survey






Proportion of GBM who reported CLAI with casual partners who received PrEP







PrEP coverage by indigenous status and sexual identity



PrEP coverage by area of residence & educational achievement







Comparison of HIV notifications data NSW and rest of Australia






Methods

- Comparison of the average annual number of HIV notifications in 2011-2015 (pre-PrEP) with the number of notifications in 2018














HIV diagnoses among MSM: Australian born








HIV diagnoses among MSM: Australian born








HIV diagnoses among MSM: Overseas born










HIV diagnoses among heterosexuals








HIV diagnoses among heterosexuals

Conclusions

- HIV diagnoses are falling in MSM in NSW and the rest of Australia
 - Similar trends in NSW/rest of Australia, but
 - NSW: steady declines since 2012
 - Rest of Australia: more recent and sharper declines
- Divergent trends by country of birth
 - Australian-born MSM: dramatic falls (40%) in HIV diagnoses
 - Overseas-born MSM: HIV diagnoses not declining
 - In NSW HIV diagnoses among overseas-born MSM now outnumber those among Australian-born
