ACON'S PEER EDUCATION

- ACON has been successfully running peer education workshops that specifically target same sex attracted men for 30 years.
- Primary focus on encouraging safe sex behaviours and practices, linking men into sexual health services, keeping men up-to-date on the latest developments in sexual health, reducing HIV stigma and providing a connection to community.



START MAKING SENSE

- 6 week workshop (one night per week for 6 weeks) facilitated by trained peers.
- Topics covered include identity, coming out, sexuality, family, friendships, relationships, community and HIV/STIs.
- Workshop has great engagement from those proficient in English (both Australian born and overseas born).
- However, it's delivery in English is a barrier to increasing sexual health knowledge for those who are not fluent.



ACON'S ASIAN GAY MEN'S PROJECT

ConversAsians

- A bi-monthly support group for gay men from Asian backgrounds at ACON.
- A safe space to meet new people, share stories and discuss relevant issues.
- Designed for and led by Asian gay men.

SocialisAsians

- More informal monthly social group to collaborate and support Asian gay men.
- To connect online or organise events and meet-ups
- Open to all members of ConverAsians and their allies from all backgrounds.


CHINESE GAY MEN

- Half stayed have been here more than 5 years (more permanent/established); nearly 40% have been here less than 2 years (more recently arrived)
- Less PrEP knowledge about its current availability (53.6% readily available now, 22.3% will be available in the future, 24% never heard of it).
- Spending more of their spare time with their ethnic community (31.5% spending 'a lot', 37% spending 'some')
- Fewer sources of HIV/STI information
- Participants stated that visa uncertainty, Medicare ineligibility, racism and isolation affect the ability to negotiate safe sex and access services.

TIMELINE OF DEVELOPMENT AND ROLLOUT



TRANSLATION

- Translating content proved difficult...
- The English workshop included many colloquialisms that were hard to translate in Chinese context
- Aware of different terms in different Chinese contexts: HIV, AIDS, Hepatitis, window period, genital warts
- Activities, materials and information handouts were all translated
- Participants were also taught sexual health information in English to prepare them to navigate public health system in English





RECRUITMENT

Promotion was done online, through social networks, workshops and brochures

ISSUES AND NEXT STEPS

- Recruitment difficulties
- Ask more nuanced questions during intake process specific to issues such as migration status, employment.
- Lack of updated and engaging in-language resources
- After four weeks, less participants. Shorten to 4 weeks, in line with ACON's other workshops.
- Further engagement peer facilitator training, social events, ACON's other projects.
- Establish a working/consultation group from previous participants and new members to review the manual, create resources from scratch and edit as appropriate.



CONCLUSIONS

- Asian gay men are not a homogenous group and as such tailored interventions are required to adequately address individual community needs.
- Culturally and linguistically targeted health promotion is important in removing barriers to accessing information and services.
- In an increasingly divergent epidemic, meaningful engagement with target populations is essential.
