Knowledge of current abortion law and views on abortion law reform: a community survey of NSW residents

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## Abortion law in Australia

- Abortions laws differ across Australia.
  - This results in varying availability of abortion services across the different states and territories.
- In NSW laws regarding abortion are governed by the Crimes Act 1900.
- All other states (except Queensland) have undertaken abortion law reform
- Notably ACT(2002), Victoria (2008) and Tasmania (2013) which removed abortion from their respective Crimes Acts

### Abortion law reform in NSW

- Dr Mehreen Faruqi (Greens MP for NSW) introduced a bill to the NSW Parliament to reform the laws regarding abortion.
- The Bill provided for
  - abortion to be removed from the Crimes Act.
  - recognised the right of medical practitioners to exercise a conscientious objection to providing abortion while ensuring women would be given referrals and objective information about options for unplanned pregnancy regardless of the personal views of their healthcare provider.
  - provided for protection from harassment for women seeking abortion, and protestor exclusion zones around abortion clinics.
- The Bill was debated but defeated in May 2017

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## Survey of NSW community views on abortion

- To inform the preparation of the Bill, Dr Faruqi's office commissioned a survey
- The survey was conducted between 1 and 10 September 2015 by a commercial market research agency using a sample derived from an on-line survey panel with a large membership base in Australia
- Panel members are not aware of the survey content before agreeing to participate and receive a small payment for each survey completed.
- Eligible participants were adult (18 years and over) men and women resident in NSW who belonged to the online survey panel.
- Eligible panel members were invited to participate and the sample was monitored to achieve the desired sample size and to meet quotas based on age, gender and location (metropolitan Sydney, regional/rural).
- The survey was carried out in accordance with the ISO standard for market, social and opinion research (ISO 20252).

## **Survey questions**

#### Attitudes towards

- decriminalisation of abortion in NSW (removing it from the Crimes Act 1900),
- the obligations of medical practitioners with conscientious objections to abortion to provide information to patients,
- the establishment of exclusion zones around abortion clinics so women accessing the services can be protected against intimidation and invasion of privacy.

#### Further questions were included on

- participants' opinions and knowledge about abortion more generally.
- a single item question asking for an opinion about women obtaining abortion was worded to be consistent with previous surveys to facilitate comparison of opinion with other surveys.
- participant demographics

Where response options were lengthy and/or multiple their order was randomised.

## **Summary**

- 76% of respondents were unaware that abortion is listed as a criminal offence in the NSW Crimes Act 1900
- 73% of respondents thought it should be decriminalised and regulated as a healthcare service
- High levels of support for decriminalisation was consistent across men and women, all age groups, residents of metropolitan/regional and rural areas, and all levels of educational achievement
- There was strong support for women seeking abortion to be protected from harassment (89%) and for protest exclusion zones around abortion clinics (81%)
- Support for decriminalisation and protection of women seeking an abortion was higher among regional/rural residents than Sydney based respondents
- A higher proportion of regional/rural residents than Sydney based respondents knew someone who had ever had an abortion

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### Conclusion

- NSW residents are largely unaware that abortion is a criminal offence in their state.
- Most believe it should be decriminalised and that women should be able to access abortion services without persecution.
