Seroconversion Event

- Participant in the Victorian PrEPX study was reported to have seroconverted in May 2017
- News broke on social media soon after the event and was reported by major news outlets
- Generated considerable public interest and commentary about PrEP and PrEP users

Aim - To conduct a content analysis of the public discourse surrounding the seroconversion





Methods

- Exhaustive search of relevant Australian news articles and associated commentary
- Structural analysis of content of articles
- Comments publically available on social media on the articles were grouped into categories:
 - Fear-based responses
 - Critical of PrEP
 - Neutral
 - Supportive
 - Evidence-based information
 - Not applicable

Results - Articles

SMH/The Age article

Generated fear and scepticism of PrEP

This has sparked fears in the gay community about possible resistance to the medication - particularly after rumours about the strain circulated on social media over the weekend.

Star Observer article

Measured, evidence-based information

majority of people taking PrEP in Australia and around the world continue to be protected by the HIV prevention tool.

Some reassurance at the end of the article

"I don't think there is any reason for alarm here. PrEP works and any rare cases of failure need to be investigated fully...

Assertive, reassuring facts throughout


"To date there have been no confirmed cases in Australia of a person on PrEP being infected with a drug-resistant HIV.

Results - Social Media responses

Over 50% of comments were supportive of PrEP and PrEP users

Condoms and PrEP both carry a very minute risk. People who take this drug have made a conscious effort to take care of their sexual health.





Results - Social Media responses

Over 50% of comments were supportive of PrEP and PrEP users

"Don't you think it would have been better to defer the reporting of this single case to the general public in a non-medical forum until after resistance is confirmed or refuted?

It **informs no one** at this stage as to the efficacy or risks of PrEP by reporting on a single case before confirming resistance, yet it serves to bolster scaremongering amongst the ill-informed."

Results – Social Media responses

Negative comments often included conservative or simplistic responses to PrEP and sex

"It's time to ban this drug in australia [sic]. The best protection is either abstaining from risky behaviour or monogamy."

"If it's not wrapped then it's not wrapped. Simple."





Discussion

- Significance of public discourses about PrEP
 - May reflect community engagement with PrEP and willingness to support its use
 - Bringing the issue into mainstream media
- Impact on government
 - Mobilising policy makers
 - Encouraging continued funding and support for **PrEP**

Discussion cont.

- Supportive and evidence-based comments
 - Reflects work of HIV sector to engage people
 - High literacy in the community
- Role of social media in changing behaviours and viewpoints
 - Enables interaction with previously unreachable individuals/groups
 - Interactions between users brings a 'real life' aspect which can have significant impact
