"It's a legal procedure. So why isn't it readily available?"

Exploring healthcare providers' experiences of delivering abortion care at 20 weeks and over in Victoria

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1. Background

Abortions at **20 weeks and over** sought for **non-medicalised reasons** are associated with significant access difficulties due to:

- Legal restrictions
- Limited services
- Stigma

Little is known about this specific area of care.



2. Aim

- To determine the enablers and barriers to delivering abortion care at 20 weeks and over for indications other than fetal or maternal medicine, and;
- To examine how quality of care could be improved;

From a healthcare provider perspective, in one hospital in Victoria, Australia.

4. Results

- 17 participants
- Medical, nursing, allied health backgrounds

THEMES

Healthcare system level

Meeting external roadblocks: deficiencies in the wider healthcare system

Clinical level

Being committed to quality care: taking a holistic approach

personal level

Surmounting challenges: being an abortion provider is difficult

SUBTHEMES

- Strengthening the abortion service
- Building capacity in the healthcare system
- Struggling through the COVID-19 pandemic

"We're the only service providing this care...there are no options for patients" (P6)



- Prioritising the woman's needs
- Creating a safe space
- Delivering timely care

"The needs of the women are always paramount" (P9)



- Providing a very different kind of abortion
- Confronting emotional and ethical challenges
- Feeling supported and valued

"It can be quite mentally and emotionally draining" (P3)



3. Methods

Study design	Exploratory qualitative study
Setting	Abortion and Contraception Service, Royal Women's Hospital, Melbourne, Australia
Participants	Regular providers of abortions ≥20 weeks for non-medicalised reasons, recruited by convenience and purposive sampling
Data collection	In-depth, semi-structured interviews
Data analysis	Reflexive thematic analysis

5. Conclusions

- Abortion provision at 20 weeks and over for non-medicalised reasons is a unique area of abortion care that providers find both challenging and rewarding.
- The lack of services providing these abortions is a significant barrier to equitable access to safe care.

Future directions

• Research and policies that **strengthen abortion provision** at 20 weeks and over in Victoria are needed, particularly to address workforce shortages and expand public provision.

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
