Submission Requirements

- All submissions must be completed electronically via the online submission facility.
- You will be required to upload the abstract at the same time through the online site.
- All abstracts must be prepared according to the guidelines provided. Abstracts will only be accepted and published if submitted using the supplied template/s.
- Abstracts submitted from people who are affiliated with tobacco, alcohol or gambling entities will not be reviewed or accepted. This includes, but is not limited to, individuals who in the last three years have accepted any sponsorship, grant or any other form of support, whether financially or otherwise; or entered into any form of association with the tobacco, e-cigarette, alcohol, or gambling industries, including but not limited to tobacco, e-cigarette, alcohol and gambling companies, manufacturers, distributors, retailers, gambling venues, and related industry-funded research bodies.
- All abstracts must be original work.
- An abstract can be submitted if the work has been or is to be published in a scientific journal or presented at a major national, or international meeting prior to APSAD 2026, where the content has been significantly changed or updated as to be a different abstract. Already published/presented work must be declared at the time of submission, failure to disclose this information will result in the abstract being rejected. Acceptance is at the discretion of the Scientific Advisory Committee (SAC).
- An abstract must contain sufficient information so that if published it will be a complete report independent of presentation. **The text should not contain statements alluding to results or conclusions not presented within the text.**
- Abstract submission acknowledges consent for publication of the abstract in the conference handbook, on the conference website and in the conference proceedings publication – *Drug and Alcohol Review* APSAD Conference Abstract Supplement.
- The contact person will be responsible for distributing all correspondence related to the submission to

all co-presenters. It is the presenting author's responsibility to check the accuracy of the abstract.

- The presenting author will be required to register for the conference in order to ensure their abstract(s) is included in the final program. **Deadline for presenting author registration is 31 September 2026.**
- There are a limited number of oral and poster positions, priority will be given to original submissions that closely align with the theme of the conference and can clearly demonstrate implications on policy, community, research, or practice. Research abstracts that do not contain results or refer to results or data being presented that are not contained in the abstract will not be accepted.
- There is no limit to the number of abstracts that may be submitted by an individual. Splitting of a body of work into multiple abstracts is discouraged and consolidation into one abstract is preferred. The SAC reserves the right to limit the number of oral presentations per author to encourage presentation diversity and may request for any abstracts submitted on the same body of work be combined into one abstract and presentation.
- The Conference Secretariat will not be held responsible for abstract submissions not received via the website or for submission errors caused by internet service outages, hardware or software delays, power outages or unforeseen events. Show us how your work is evolving the AOD landscape and providing fresh insights into service delivery.</p> <p>This option allows you to report on projects that are not research-driven but are critical reflections on policy</p>

			<p>and practice, including clinical practice, community engagement, education, health promotion, and service delivery. In all cases we are looking for analyses and projects that are completed and have concrete results to report.</p> <p>The practice-based abstract template asks delegates to describe the analysis and arguments used, and then specify outcomes, results and implications for policy and practice. We encourage our community, nursing, policy, health promotion and other colleagues to try the template and submit abstracts.</p> <p>Please use the Practice Based Oral Abstract Template.</p>
	Lightning Talks	5 minutes	<p>Lightning talks allow for a succinct overview of findings. These could be presentations of original research, clinical practice, community engagement, education, health promotion and policy. This presentation type could be used for case studies, clinical perspectives, new services, and consumer viewpoints.</p> <p>These presentations do not require the same rigorous research basis as Research Based presentations but should describe the implications of the work on practice, policy and/or community.</p> <p>Research and practice abstracts must be submitted using the relevant oral abstract template.</p>
VISUAL PRESENTATIONS	Poster	<p>Permanently displayed during the conference.</p> <p>Presenters must stand with their posters during the dedicated Poster Sessions.</p>	<p>Posters are a key component of the APSAD Conference offering an interactive platform for delegates to view and discuss achievements, ideas, and developments face-to-face.</p> <p>Posters are ideal for data that works better visually, projects and research being proposed or currently in progress, systematic reviews, meta-analysis, case studies, divisional projects, or clinical topics.</p> <p>All posters will be available on the conference website and in the app.</p> <p>Poster abstracts must be submitted using the relevant oral abstract template.</p>

	Panel Symposium	60 mins	<p>Panel Symposia are designed for deep dive exploration, these presentations offer a platform for safe, culturally informed, and evidence-based dialogue from diverse perspectives. We invite panels that challenge the status quo through robust discussion on a unified theme.</p> <p>Panel Symposia should include a clear description of the topic to be discussed and outline how the discussion will be managed between the panellists and between the panellists and the audience.</p> <p>You <u>must</u> include members of the community being referred to/discussed (e.g. First Nations people, people with lived/living experience) on your panel to ensure affected communities have a voice and are part of the solution.</p> <p>Please use the Panel Symposium Abstract Template.</p>
	Workshop	30 - 60 mins	<p>Workshops are interactive information /training sessions and should facilitate discussion and engage with the participants.</p> <p>Lecture-style presentation should be kept to a minimum, workshops are a facilitation exercise. <p>Social Science & Policy Research</p>	<p>Abstracts may include empirical or non-empirical (conceptual/theoretical) studies which focus on social, structural, cultural, material and policy contexts. They may include evaluations of policies, analysis of policy making processes, analysis of stakeholders to policy and analysis of policy statements. They may include studies by people with lived and living experience and provider perspectives.</p>

ABSTRACT GUIDELINES

All abstracts must:

- Be prepared in Arial 11-point type only on the appropriate APSAD 2026 TEMPLATE. The document must not be password protected or read-only as this may result in your abstract failing to upload successfully
- Single spacing should be used.
- Format - Microsoft Word (.doc or .docx) file only.
- Start each paragraph on a new line.
- Specify all abbreviations in full at the first mention, followed by the abbreviation in parentheses; thereafter, the abbreviation only should be used. Do not use abbreviations in the title. Only include an abbreviation in the abstract if it is used at least twice after the first mention.
- Abstracts must be original and written in English with Australian spelling.
- Abstracts must NOT have a header or footer on the page.
- Download the appropriate template for your submission.

All abstracts must include:

- Title should appear in bold in sentence case at the top of the abstract.
- Principal author to appear first.
- Underline the name of the author who will be presenting the paper.
- All authors must be listed with their first name, any initials and surname, with commas between each name.
- Omit degrees and titles.
- Include affiliations/organisation for each author (i.e., department, institution, city, country). Use superscript numbering after the author's name to indicate affiliations.
- Include the presenter's email address.
- Choose which subheadings work for your abstract and delete the subheadings not being used.

Body of Abstract:

- Maximum length is 300 words (excess words may not be printed) per presentation.
- Content must include the study's objectives, methodology (if relevant), a summary of results and conclusion.
- Present your work as a structured abstract using the appropriate subheadings included on the template.
- Do not use the carriage return (Enter) at the end of lines within a paragraph.
- Abstracts that include information on *implications for communities, practice, policy and/or First Nations communities*, including—where relevant—how the research, program or policy impacts on diverse and/or priority populations will be given preference when reviewing and programming.
- References should be indicated in the text using numbers inside square brackets (e.g. [1]) and included as a list following the abstract. The style of the references should follow the style of the Journal, which is Vancouver, i.e., numbered. All citations mentioned in the abstract must be listed in the reference list, and the reference list may not include works not cited.
- Tables and figures can be included with abstracts and must be cited in the abstract text. The abstracts themselves must be in text, not table format.

Note: Your abstract will not be accepted if it does not conform to the guidelines.
