

#### Results

#### **Most students:**

- Received RSE (n=4,689, 83.5%)
- In HPE (n=3,271, 70.2%)
- In years 7/8 (n=3,521, 75.5%) and/or 9/10 (n=3,744,

80.2%)

- Delivered by a teacher (n=3,797, 81.5%)
- Somewhat/a little/not at all relevant (n=2,880, 46.6%)



# **Theme 2: Delivery**

<u>TIMING</u>: "It would be helpful to have more [...] in year 11/12 when people are closer to being adults and can understand the whole conversation a bit easier, but also keep the younger years so peeps are exposed to all that earlier (Female student, Age 17)."

FREQUENCY: "We needed more of it because the time we had it was about 1-2 years ago and it's not that memorable anymore (Female student, Age 15)."

SUFFICIENCY: "My school has never offered it other than a very brief talk in health one time (Female student, Age 16)."

DURATION: "My headmaster cut it off because he felt it wasn't important, so we only got 1 year of it (Male student, Age 16)."

#### Theme 4: Knowledge/Attitudes/Beliefs

KNOWLEDGE: "It's very behind the students common knowledge [...] It's more enforcing things they already know (which can be very boring) rather than teaching them something new (Male student, Age 16)."

ATTITUDES: "Encourage them to do it safely. You're not going to stamp out sexuality by not talking about sex. You're just going to give kids no options to do it responsibly (Female student, Age 16)."

BELIEFS: "I think it's unfair and un progressive that our education system fail to educate students on same sex sex and relationships (Female student, Age 15)."





# **Theme 5: School Type**

"Went to public school from year 8-10 and we had heaps of talks and info about it every term and we're very well educated. Currently at a catholic school and not a single thing about sex has ever been mentioned (Female student, Age 15)."







#### **Theme 6: Teacher Effectiveness**

"Many teachers are unaware of what the students are undergoing, as they live in a hypersexualised culture in which, the average age of viewing porn is 12. This is devastating and teachers do not know how to present sensitive content effectively (Male student, Age 16)."







#### Theme 7: Beyond the Classroom

"I [...] have often resorted to online resources to understand my body, sexual relationships, intercourse, pregnancy, contraception and other related topics (Female student, Age 17)."





# **Positive Experiences**







#### Discussion

1. Most student RSE experiences remain unchanged despite AC:HPE

2. Students value RSE, but comments reflect inconsistent teaching



- **3.** Knowledge scores have remained moderate to low since 2013
- 4. Year 12 students continue to hold the highest knowledge scores even though RSE is taught in years 7-10
