The convening theme for the Open Space Technology (OST) will be:

Where to now: How do we shape the future of Restorative Practice...

- **Starting with me?**
- **Where I work and live?**
- **In a particular field of practice or location?**
- **In and for the global social movement?**

Open Space works run as noted below:

- At the beginning of the day, participants will meet in a large circle format.
- You will have the opportunity, if you wish, to convene one or more conversations about any aspect of the above theme which you care to talk about.
- Participants then self-organise into smaller break-out spaces, in multiple parallel sessions.
- There is no limit to the number of conversations that can be convened.
- Your freedom to participate at whatever level you wish will be respected.
- Towards the end of the day, there will be an opportunity for 'next steps' action-planning, where groups can exchange contact details and decide how to keep conversations going after the conference.

Open Space enables:

- Themes from keynote addresses and workshops to be explored, conversationally, in more depth
- Interaction around themes which cross multiple fields of practice
- Deepening of professional networks

Please note that conversations will evolve as small interactive groups rather than formal presentations. Professor Jennifer Llewellyn

Jennifer Llewellyn is Professor of Law, Chair in Restorative Justice and Director of the Restorative Research, Innovation and Education Lab at the Schulich School of Law, Dalhousie University in Nova Scotia, Canada. A Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada, her teaching and research focus on relational theory, restorative justice, justice transformation, truth commissions, peacebuilding, international and

domestic human rights law, public law, and Canadian constitutional law.

She has advised governments and NGO's, supported many governments, projects and programs including the Nova Scotia Restorative Justice Program, the Nova Scotia Human Rights Commission, the South African and Canadian Truth and Reconciliation Commission, and the governments of Columbia, the Jamaican New Zealand and the United Nations. She was appointed as an expert on the UN mechanism to review the UN Basic Principles for the Use of Restorative Justice in Criminal Matters. Additionally, Professor Llewellyn facilitated the design process for the first restorative public inquiry and served as a commissioner for the Inquiry into the Nova Scotia Home for Coloured Children.

Recognized for her contribution in the field of restorative justice, Professor Llewellyn was awarded the National Ron Wiebe Restorative Justice Award from Correctional Services Canada in 2015, was the 2018 recipient of the Canadian Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council National Impact Award, the highest award for research achievement and impact in Canada, and in 2019, she received the Dalhousie University President's Research Excellence Award for Research Impact



Debbie McGrath

Debbie McGrath lives and works on Wiradjuri country. She is a social worker who is passionate and committed to women's rights especially in regards to domestic and family violence, sexual assault within marriage and sexual assault.

Debbie has twenty-nine years' experience with the NSW Homicide Victims Support Group as a member and volunteer and experience with the Restorative Justice Unit in the NSW Department of Communities & Justice.

Debbie participated in her own restorative justice conference with her brother Michael's murderer before he was released on parole. Debbie's conference changed her life, she left her conference a different person then when she went in and Debbie started to heal. Debbie has gone on to be support person with two other families in their conferences. They were both completely different and they were both healing and empowering experiences. Debbie came out of her conference a changed person.

Debbie has recently become involved with Transforming Justice Australia, a unique restorative justice program in Australia that prioritises the needs and perspectives of survivors of sexual and family violence.



Emeritus Professor Judy Atkinson

Emeritus Professor Judy Atkinson is a Jiman (central west Queensland) and Bundjalung (Northern New South Wales) woman, with Anglo-Celtic and German heritage. As the founder of We Al-li she is currently their patron and working across many community-based trauma healing programs.

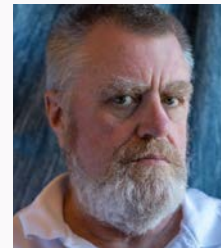
She is an international renowned leader and researcher in intergenerational trauma. Her

academic contributions to the understanding of trauma related issues stemming from the violence of colonisation and the healing/recovery of Indigenous peoples from such trauma has won her the Carrick Neville Bonner Award in 2006 for her curriculum development and innovative teaching practice.

In 2011 she was awarded the Fritz Redlick Memorial Award for Human Rights and Mental Health from the Harvard University program for refugee trauma. Her best-selling book 'Trauma Trails – Recreating Songlines:

The transgenerational effects of trauma in Indigenous Australia', provides context to the life stories of people who have been moved from their country in a process that has created trauma trails, and the changes that can occur in the lives of people as they make connection with each other and share their stories of healing. Judy is a member of the Harvard Global Mental Health Scientific Research Alliance and Chair of the Australian Childhood Foundations Cultural Governance Group.

On the 26 January 2019 Judy received a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) for her outstanding services to the Indigenous community, to education and to mental health.



Provincial Archdeacon Uncle Glenn Loughrey

Glenn is a Wiradjuri man, Vicar at St Oswald's Glen Iris, First Indigenous Canon of St Paul's Cathedral; Current Chair of National Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Council (NATSIAIC); Honorary Professor at the Australian National University, Crawford School of Public Policy; was the ANU's Institute for Water Future's Cultural Resident 2022; is on the Board of

the ANU Water Justice Hub; on the Community Advisory Committee of the Australasian College of Pathology and a member of its Māori and Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Working Group; key advisor to the Boroondara Council in the Development of its 2022 Reconciliation Strategy; is the initiator of the EmpowerToTeach website providing teaching frameworks and resources to teachers teaching foundation to year 10 on Indigenous culture and history; initiated the Wominjeka Reconciliation Garden at St Oswald's which is now recognised as one of the 5 significant cultural sites in Melbourne's inner-east; initiated the Murnong Aboriginal Art Gallery at St Oswald's and the steering committee to set up this up as the Murnong Indigenous Gathering Place in Melbourne's Inner East; was the Melbourne Diocese Educator and Advocate on the upcoming referendum and provides advice on the Statement from the Heart and Voice, Treaty, Truth and Makarrata to politicians on all sides of Parliament.

He is a practising artist who has been a finalist in 5 major art prizes and has work in the ANU gallery (2), St Paul's Cathedral (3) and was responsible for the design of the glass panels in the Narthex screen at St Paul's Melbourne. He is an author and co-author of 3 books and contributor to several others.

He is married to Gaye, has a daughter Katrina, a Springer Spaniel called Jemma and a Harley Davidson Fat Bob who prefers to be just called Bob.

Dr Mara Schiff

Dr Mara Schiff is Associate Professor in the School of Criminology and Criminal Justice at Florida Atlantic University, former Vice-President of the National Association for Community and Restorative Justice, and was an elected school board member in Indian River County, Florida. Dr. Schiff was recently served as a U.S. Fulbright Scholar in Belgium examining restorative approaches to education, justice and

citizen engagement. She publishes, teaches and lectures on systemic structural injustice in restorative theory and practice in criminal-legal and educational settings. She has received multiple fellowships, teaching and leadership awards, and speaks and trains nationally and internationally on restorative justice.



Dr Andrea Pâroșanu

Dr Andrea Pâroșanu is a Senior Research Fellow at Te Ngāpara Centre for Restorative Practice, Te Herenga Waka - Victoria University of Wellington, New Zealand. Her research interests include restorative justice, particularly in the areas of youth justice and family violence, as well as community-based alternatives to imprisonment.



Dr Fernanda Fonseca Rosenblatt

Fernanda Fonseca Rosenblatt is an Associate Professor at the International Institute for Restorative Practices (IIRP, USA) and a Professor of Law at the Catholic University of Pernambuco (Brazil).

She is an active member within the restorative justice movement, serving as the Book Review Editor for the International Journal of Restorative Justice and as a member of the Research Committee of the European Forum for Restorative Justice.
