


Port of Melbourne: Importance of Grain


In FY24, grains, primarily wheat, played a dominant role in the Port of Melbourne's exports, comprising 30% of total exports by metric tonnes (3.37m tonnes). This trend is also consistent in containerised cargo, where wheat takes the lead.



Port of Melbourne: Grains Export Markets

Grain has solidified its position as the port's largest export commodity, showing a substantial recovery from the drought-induced low in FY19 and achieving robust year-on-year growth with a CAGR of 36% through to FY24. Notably, barley has become a leading grain export following the lifting of China's ban on Australian barley. Consequently, China's importance as an importer of the port's grains has increased significantly, rising from 18% in FY23 to 30% in FY24.
