Increased competition for fewer jobs



Pressure on pricing and QA standards



Need to protect quality and team capability



#### Global Tensions, Local Impacts



Ongoing global instability: conflict, supply chains, trade

China, US and EU growth slowing has ripple effects for NZ

NZ is small, open and exposed so we feel the shock quickly.

Tariffs we thought were 10% a week ago, now 15%



# The 'why': Economic Headwinds



NZ in recession in 2024, forecast to return to growth in 2026

Inflation back to 2.7%, OCR tracking to 3%

Conditions setting up for investment recovery

Residential sector contracting (-7%)

Long-term pipeline: \$200B+ still planned
