Bike helmet (will be provided)



Thorndon Quay is one of the most important commuter routes for Wellingtonians. Each day during the week, about 10,000 people travel this route by bus, making it the busiest bus route outside of the city centre. Hundreds of people also travel this route by bike, and this number is expected to increase

significantly when Te Ara Tupua opens in early 2026, providing a safe cycle route between Hutt Valley and Wellington.

Construction on Thorndon Quay started in late 2023 and was completed 15 July 2025. To make it easier for more people to use sustainable transport options, we've made a range of improvements:

- Peak hour bus lanes into the city to improve bus travel times
- A two-way cycle path on the seaward side of the route to avoid intersections and the bus interchange
- Five signalised pedestrian/bike crossings, two of which are raised
- Improved lighting and planting, along with mana whenua designed cultural elements to mark the location of underground awa (streams).

These changes are designed to make travel along Thorndon Quay safer, more efficient, and more enjoyable for all.



New Zealand Transport Agency Waka Kotahi (NZTA) is partnering with iwi mana whenua (Taranaki Whānui and Ngāti Toa) and local Councils (Wellington City, Greater Wellington and Hutt City) to provide a new walking and cycling route between Wellington and Lower Hutt. Te Ara Tupua that will improve transport resilience while creating a walking and

cycling link between Wellington and Lower Hutt.
