Te Ara Haepapa

Te Ara Haepapa (The Journey) was developed in 2017 to address treaty partnership obligations.

Auckland Transport was aware Māori were over represented in deaths and serious injury road crashes in Tāmaki Makaurau, Aotearoa (Auckland, New Zealand)



Treaty partnership





Background

Māori are over-represented in road deaths and serious injuries (DSI) in Tāmaki Makaurau (Auckland).

In 2017 they were involved in **15%** of all DSI while making up only **10%** of the resident population.

Māori DSI had increased by **108%** from **60** in **2014** to **125** in **2017**. Rangatahi (young adult) Māori aged 16-24 years made up **26%** of total Māori DSI in **2017**, and many of these were drivers.

In **2018**, Māori DSI decreased by **24%** from the previous year from **125** to **95**.





Background

Historically, there has been a larger number of Rangatahi Māori involved in DSI who do not have a formal Driver Licence, and **50%** of Rangatahi Māori aged 16 to 24 years in the NZ Justice System, have ended up there as a result of driving related offences.

Results

The 2019 Kaihautū Programme worked with **184** Raihana Ākonga (Learner Driver) participants and **96%** of those who sat the test passed. This is a pass-rate higher than the Tāmaki Makaurau average for all young drivers aged 16 to 24 years in 2018 (74%).

Also in 2019, **113** Rangatahi attended our Raihana Whītiki (Restricted Driver) programme along with **8** Raihana Tūturu (Full). All of the students who went on to sit their Raihana Whītiki /Tūturu (Restricted/Full Driver Licence) passed on the first attempt.





Results

While it is difficult to directly link Driver Licensing uptake from the Kaihautu Programme among Rangatahi Māori and road death and serious injury (DSI) outcomes for the same population in Tāmaki Makaurau, it has been encouraging to note a **46%** reduction in Rangatahi Māori driver-related DSI from **15 in 2017** to **8 in 2018**
