Funding

Briefing to an Incoming Government

Enabling Good Lives (EGL)

- Review funding to accommodate EGL properly.
- More transparency in funding and accountability for spending the funding.
- Sort out the discrimination for people living in residential services and their funding.
- EGL is not new.
- More support is needed to help find and access services e.g. respite options.
- Standardise EGL countrywide.
- The ideology of EGL that families have been sold is not supported by NASC's and their limited contracts, and lack of funding to make wishes happen.
- Individualised funding is not delivering and is almost gaslighting families.
- Implement EGL throughout New Zealand including in terms of infrastructure eg having navigators / connectors.

Ministry of Education

- More resourcing for teachers and professional development.
- Resource a life skills curriculum in schools for intellectual disability.
- Better education of government staff who handle and deal with funding of people who have a disability.
- Support and help for people who leave school and are transitioning to the wider world.
- Training for special education teachers.
- Education provide choice in services, mainstream, special class, special schools and allow whanau to move between these on a needs basis to provide equitable access to specialist services.



- Increase funding for assessment of children so no-one is excluded, pending assessment. No waiting to attend school.
- Access for specialist services wherever attending school.
- Life skills. Suitable curriculum in the school.

Whaikaha

- Standardise funding across the industry / sector.
- Clear timelines for Whaikaha to deliver measurable outcomes.
- Foetal alcohol syndrome / intellectual disability needs to be included and resourced, education.
- Respite care more than \$80 per day and speed up repayments.
- Whaikaha needs meaningful philosophy and values, dignity when talking to people with a disability. Ensure people with an intellectual disability have a proper voice.
- Disability awareness of disability in action policy
- Whaikaha needs to understand the specific needs of people with an intellectual disability. Seems to be more of a focus on people with a physical disability.
- Whaikaha needs to be properly resourced and more responsive.
- Whaikaha who are they and what are they doing?
- Certainty of funding for providers and adequate funding.
- Carers payment (for all but two tiers means-tested).
- Funding for vocational support for people in Supported Living, five days per week.
- Adult literacy and numeracy support (beyond six weeks).
- Allow payment of less than minimum wage so work programmes for intellectually disabled.
- Psychiatric services available for people with intellectual disability funded.
- If there is an expansion of eligibility e.g., FAS needs to be properly funded.
- People are living for longer there is a need to cater for people with an intellectual disability.
- Disability Ministry Whaikaha what does it do?
- Flexible respite is required.
- Wages at only \$21, this is a hard job.
- Recognition of overseas qualification.
- A holistic view of intellectual disability think Durie's Te Whare Tapawha include the whole family.

Ministry of Health

- Better GP training around intellectual disability.
- Subsidise medical blanket fee of \$10 visit.
- Funding to be prioritised. Access to medical same as rest of population when need more.
- Better dental care (free).
- Prescription costs?



Disability Sector

- Training required for all professional groups.
- Recruitment of suitable staff.
- Retention of suitable staff is a priority.
- Make welfare guardianship simpler to assist in getting medical help etc.
- Disabled people are being treated differently to other members of the community (IDI data).
- Minister for Disabilities should be inside Cabinet, not outside.
- Needs to be info-sharing between MSD / Health and Whaikaha so that Whaikaha is a one-stop shop.
- Benefit_pay over 65 year olds winter energy payment.
- No payment for full-time carers means no retirement savings for carer.
- Support workers better pay, training and career options.
- Increase in their benefits.
- Census form should clearly identify those with an intellectual disability.

Employment for People with an Intellectual Disability

- What action will the Government take to employ people with intellectual disabilities?
- School leavers training apprenticeships.
- Accredited employer status.
- Vocational training for intellectual disability.
