Disability Rights Commissioner role

•To uphold and protect the rights of disabled people.

Rights covered by national and international agreements and laws, e.g.

- Human Rights Act 1993;
- The United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities;
- consistent with Te Tiriti o Waitangi.



Human rights including

- •the right to health;
- participation in decisions that affect us;
- access to information provided in ways we can understand;
- •reasonable accommodations or modifications.



We don't all get to enjoy these rights

- the way society is set up and negative attitudes to disability
- •the pandemic has exacerbated the gaps
- the responses have not always met the needs of disabled people.



Human Rights Commission Inquiry

urgent inquiry into Omicron responses impact on disabled people (March 2022)*

• confirmed that disabled people's needs not fully taken into account

•trust and engagement in the response affected.

•This does not bode well for how people with Long Covid are faring now or in the future.

People with Long Covid at risk of discrimination

• Stories of discrimination similar to experiences of people with chronic health conditions

- Not believed
- Not recognised or understood in health system
- Lack of support

Social Model of Disability vs Medical Model

Social Model – society, attitudes and systems create barriers

VS

Medical Model – impairments and individuals are blamed



Te Tiriti o Waitangi

•Self-determination and participation as Māori and tāngata whaikaha Māori.

 critical that tāngata whaikaha Māori voices are included at the centre of decision-making and planning.
