Australian Government

The National Summit on Women's Safety represents the culmination point of a program of consultation activities to inform the next National Plan to end violence against women and children. A series of workshops, interviews, and a public survey have already provided important insight into national priorities.

The Summit will build on prior consultation activities and will focus on **key issues affecting women's safety**, including the prevention of violence, technology and abuse, coercive control, policing and justice responses, sexual violence, frontline service delivery and innovation, violence experienced by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women and strengthening partnerships with the private sector to prevent and reduce violence.

A series of roundtables will be held prior to the Summit. The roundtables, together with the Summit keynote addresses and panel discussions on issues affecting women's safety, will **contribute insights and help determine the priorities for the next National Plan.**
