Thailand's Situation

Social Protection

- High coverage but thin benefits
- Many universal schemes with introduction of poverty-targeted programs since 2015
- COVID-19 led to rapid development of electronic payment system



Inflation



 Inflation hiked in 2022 due to high energy and food prices



Social Protection Responses to Inflation

- Minimum Wage
 - Minimum daily wage raise by 5.02%, effective Oct. 1, 2022 after being frozen since January 2020.
- State Welfare Card (SWC)
 - "Purchasing-Power Enhancing Program" for SWC holders and those with special needs to receive 400 Baht in Oct. 2022
 - Street vendors with SWC received 100 Baht/month discount of LPG price until the end of Sep. 2022
 - Increase of LPG subsidy to SWC holders from 45 Baht/month to 100 Baht/month during May-Jul, 2022
- Social Security Fund
 - Monthly contributions for Section 33 members will be reduced from 5% to 1% during May-Jul, 2022 while contributions for those under Section 39 and Section 40 will be lowered from 9% to 1.9%, and lowered to 42-180 Baht per month, respectively.

• Fuel Subsidies

- Maintaining the retail price of NGV gas at 15.59 Baht/kg. Taxi drivers in "Lom Hai Jai Deaw Kun (Breathe Together)" could buy gas at 13.62 Baht/kg. until Sep. 15, 2022
- A cap on the retail prices of LPG tanks at 408 Baht/tank during Jul-Sep, 2022

• Other Measures

- Gasohol support of 250 Baht/month to 157,000 registered public motorcycles during May-Sep, 2022
- Stimulate MICE (meetings, incentives, conferences and exhibitions) tourism, by allowing for tax reduction Jul-Dec, 2022
- Extend the fourth phase of the "Rao Tiew Duay Kan" (We Travel Together) domestic tourism promotion scheme.

Next Steps

Integration of Social Protection System

- Thailand's social protection is fragmented, creating inefficiencies in program management
- Rapid demographic transformation leads to fiscal sustainability challenge
- Integration of data through single national ID

Promote more Co-payment System

- Currently 90% of SP programs are non-contributory
- Rapid ageing will create high fiscal imbalance

Shock-Responsive SP

- Highly impacted by climate change
- Large informal sector and new types of work
