Helsinki - Where East meets West

Helsinki, Finland's vibrant capital on the Baltic Sea, hosts over half a million residents and serves as the nation's administrative, educational, cultural, financial, and business hub. It's part of a metropolitan area exceeding one million people. Helsinki blends modernity with a rich history spanning over 450 years, showcasing diverse architectural styles. Known for its high quality of life, the city offers a compact cosmopolitan environment where nature is close at hand. It boasts a lively nightlife, varied dining scene, and is renowned for safety, cleanliness, and functional urban planning. Helsinki embraces innovation while preserving its unique charm and welcoming atmosphere.

Musiikkitalo (Helsinki Music Centre) 🔗

Musiikkitalo opened in 2011 and features outstanding facilities, design and acoustics. It is located in the heart of Helsinki. In addition to the 1704 capacity Great Concert Hall, which is designed for acoustic music, there are also five smaller halls in Musiikkitalo; Black Box, Camerata, Organo, Sonore, a large Rehearsal Room and a club style restaurant.

Each of the smaller halls are designed to cater for different acoustics as well as amplified settings, totaling more than 1000 seats. All of the halls are equipped with state of the art PA and presentation systems Musiikkitalo is a fully accessible venue. It is a concert venue and meeting place open to all being full of action from morning to evening. Everyone is welcome to spend time in Musiikkitalo fovers, café, restaurant and the Sibelius Academy Library even when they are not planning to attend one of the evening's concerts. Helsinki's best classical music record store, Fuga Musiikki, is also located in the venue.

The residents of Musiikkitalo are the Helsinki Philharmonic Orchestra, the Finnish Radio Symphony Orchestra, and the Sibelius Academy. During the season from September to May, Musiikkitalo hosts 70 to 100 concerts and other events every month. The diverse concert calendar has something for everybody: classical, folk, jazz, world, pop, as well as concerts and events for children and families.

UniArts Helsinki D

The University of the Arts Helsinki (Uniarts Helsinki) provides the highest level of education in music, fine arts, performing arts and writing in Finland. Uniarts Helsinki is an international forerunner in education and research in the field of arts. We strengthen the role of art as a force that reforms society. Established in 2013, Uniarts Helsinki consists of the Academy of Fine Arts, Sibelius Academy and Theatre Academy.

Ô Little Finlandia

Little Finlandia, a new wooden pavilion-like experience center, has opened in the middle of the most beautiful area of Helsinki. This incomparable, unique event venue offers a unique setting for unforgettable occasions.

Little Finlandia is created as a modern wooden building, which respects Finnish nature and its unique environment in a durable and beautiful way. In addition to functionality and adaptability, the unique architecture emphasizes nature, light, ecological and recyclable materials, as well as a timeless, future oriented atmosphere.

Scandic Park and Crowne Plaza Helsinki

These two hotels are located side by side within a 10 minute walk from Musiikkitalo and Little Finlandia and also offer accommodation for conference delegates at negotiated rates (bookings via ISME 2024 registration form). The hotels have a large selection of flexible meeting and conference rooms with state of the art technology. Views over Töölönlahti Bay from the upper floors are breathtaking.

Keynotes

Keynotes-continued

André de Quadros is recognized as a prominent figure in human rights education, celebrated by the Wallenberg Institute of Human Rights for his impactful work across 40 countries. He is a multifaceted individual, blending roles as a conductor, ethnomusicologist, and music educator with a deep commitment to human rights activism. His initiatives span diverse environments including prisons, refugee camps, and post-conflict zones, addressing issues such as mass incarceration, forced migration, LGBTQ+ rights, and peacebuilding through music. André directs international choirs in Indonesia, Sri Lanka, and the US, and leads projects like Common Ground Voices in Israel and Palestine, and Common Ground Voices / La Frontera along the Mexico-US border. At Boston University, where he is a professor, André integrates music with studies in African, Asian, Jewish, and Muslim cultures, fostering interdisciplinary dialogue. He also oversees The Choral Commons, a platform focusing on justice through media and education, exemplifying his dedication to transformative social change.

Kristina Arakelyan, hailed as a 'rising star' by BBC Music Magazine, is celebrated for her emotive and lyrical compositions spanning opera, choral, symphonic, and chamber music. Born in Armenia, her musical journey began with early piano lessons and led her to the Purcell School in the UK on scholarship at age 11. She furthered her studies at the Royal Academy of Music, University of Oxford, and King's College London, earning a PhD in composition. Kristina has garnered numerous accolades, including winning the BBC Proms Young Composers Competition and representing the UK at international forums. Her works, frequently featured on BBC Radio 3, include commissions from prominent institutions like the BBC Proms and BBC Concert Orchestra. Alongside her composing career, Kristina is dedicated to music education, teaching at institutions including the Junior Royal Academy of Music and advocating for broader access to classical music education. Her compositions are published widely and encompass educational materials for various musical organizations.

Dr. Tuulikki Laes is a researcher and lecturer at the University of the Arts Helsinki, specializing in music education policy, systems thinking, democracy, inclusion, and social justice. She holds a PhD in music education and is actively involved in international discourse through her membership in the ISME Commission for Policy: Culture, Education and Media. Her forthcoming co-edited book, "The Transformative Politics of Music Education," reflects her commitment to exploring the intersection of music education and societal change. Currently, she leads the Academy Research Fellowship project "Performing the Political – Public Pedagogy in Higher Music Education," funded by the Research Council of Finland.

Dr. Guadalupe López-Íñiguez, also based at the University of the Arts Helsinki, holds a PhD in the psychology of music education. Her research spans constructivism, talent development, wellbeing, and music pedagogy, with significant contributions to journals and edited volumes. She co-edits ISME's Spanish language journal and leads the project "The Politics of Care in the Professional Education of Children Gifted for Music," funded by the Research Council of Finland.

Dr. Heidi Westerlund, a professor at the Sibelius Academy, focuses on higher arts education, cultural diversity, and music professionalism. Her extensive publication record includes works on music education and democracy, co-authored and co-ed-ited with international scholars. She currently directs research projects funded by the Research Council of Finland, exploring topics such as eco-politics in music education and gender inclusion in Nepal's musical landscapes.



David Maggs is a versatile interdisciplinary artist and researcher renowned for his work at the intersection of arts, climate change, and sustainability. He founded Dark by Five and has composed for stage productions, while also pioneering augmented and virtual reality projects featured in the UK's Future of Live Performance Spotlight Gallery. As artistic director of Camber Arts in rural Canada, he explores interarts initiatives. His advocacy extends to filmmaking, such as the CBC doc channel's "The Country," examining Indigenous identity in Newfoundland. At the University of Toronto's Munk School for Global Affairs, David co-authored "Sustainability in an Imaginary World," delving into art's role in sustainability. He served as a senior fellow at the Institute for Advanced Studies in Sustainability in Potsdam, Germany, focusing on culture and climate change. David's impactful contributions include reports on impact investing in cultural sectors and engagements as a keynote speaker at global conferences, highlighting his profound influence on arts and society dialogue worldwide.

In Memoriam

Alongside celebrating our achievements over the past two years, we must also take a moment to remember and honor those ISME Honorary Life Members who have passed away. Their contributions and presence will be deeply missed, and their legacies continue to resonate within our community. While their absence leaves a void, we cherish the memories and the profound impact they had on music education worldwide. Let us reflect on their dedication, wisdom, and unwavering commitment to advancing the field of music education. Though they are no longer with us, their spirit lives on through the countless lives they touched and the enduring influence of their work.

On 28 April 2024, the global music education community mourned the loss of Graham Bartle, an esteemed figure who passed away at 95. Graham Bartle made profound contributions to music education, recognized with Honorary Life Memberships from ISME in 2004, VMTA in 2003, and ASME in 2018, along with the Medal of the Order of Australia. Beginning his teaching career in 1949, he became the first music lecturer at Melbourne's Secondary Teachers' College in 1962, later advancing to the University of Melbourne's Faculty of Music.

A pivotal figure in ISME since 1974, Graham was instrumental in creating the International Directory of Music and Music Education Institutions (IDMME) and initiated the ISME sponsorship program in 1998, facilitating global participation in ISME conferences.

Graham's dedication extended to teaching until his passing, maintaining a small practice and fostering friendships worldwide. His legacy of humor, dedication, and advocacy for music education will be deeply missed by the international music education community.



The ISME community mourns the loss of Honorary Life Member Paul R. Lehman, who passed away on 24 March 2024 in Austin. Texas, at 92 years old, Originally from Ohio, Paul earned his B.S.Ed. from Ohio University in 1953 and his M.M. and Ph.D. from the University of Michigan in 1959 and 1962. His distinguished career included teaching at the University of Colorado, University of Kentucky, and Eastman School of Music, before returning to the University of Michigan in 1975 where he later served as associate dean until his retirement in 1997.

Paul Lehman was a seminal figure in music education, publishing over two hundred works on education reform, music teacher training, and assessment, translated into multiple languages. His advocacy for music in K-12 education spanned over forty-five years with the National Association for Music Education (NAfME), where he served as national president and contributed to the development of national music education standards. Paul was deeply involved with ISME for decades, serving on the Board of Directors and contributing significantly to various committees. His passion and vision for music education leave an indelible mark on the global community.

Violeta Hemsy de Gainza (25 January 1929 – 7 July 2023) was an Argentine pianist and music educator known for her advocacy of music education as a fundamental human right. Born in Tucumán Province to Turkish Sephardic immigrants, she initially pursued chemistry before focusing on music, earning scholarships to Columbia University and studying under notable figures in music therapy and pedagogy.

Her career was marked by significant contributions: directing music therapy initiatives internationally, teaching at universities including La Plata and Buenos Aires, and holding leadership roles in organizations like the International Society for Music Education. She authored numerous publications translated into multiple languages, covering topics from music pedagogy to therapy. Recognized with awards such as the Konex Award, she influenced generations of musicians including Andrés Calamaro and Fito Páez.

Despite health challenges later in life, including blindness, Hemsy remained active, playing the piano and continuing to teach until her passing in 2023. Her legacy underscores the transformative power of music and inclusive education.





About ISME

The International Society for Music Education (ISME), established in 1953 in Brussels, emerged from a UNESCO conference on music's role in education. ISME connects music educators globally, advocating for music education across all ages to foster cultural understanding. Biennial world conferences in diverse locations feature workshops, presentations, and performances. ISME also supports regional conferences in Africa, Asia Pacific, Europe, and the Americas, alongside special interest groups like research, community music, early childhood education, professional musician training, cultural policy, music in schools, and special education. Each group hosts seminars and collaborates closely with ISME's overarching mission to enhance music education worldwide.

From its beginnings, ISME has grown its membership to over 2200 individuals across 80 countries. In addition to the biennial World Conference, ISME organizes 8 pre-conferences alongside its commissions, complemented by 5 regional conferences held on odd years.

Quarterly, ISME collaborates with Sage Publications to produce the International Journal of Music Education and Revista Internacional de Educacion Musical, the official peer-reviewed Spanish-language journal. Furthermore, ISME partners with Routledge for an ongoing book series.

Throughout the year, ISME, in conjunction with its Student Chapter and Advocacy Committee, presents several online professional development webinars, featuring sessions hosted by ISME commissions, offering continuous educational content.

Over the past two years, ISME has provided support through initiatives such as the Parsons Advocacy Awards, JW Pepper Songwriting Composition Competition, and Sempre World Conference Travel Awards, totaling nearly \$75,000 in funding. Future plans include the introduction of ongoing research awards in Early Childhood Music Education and other fields.

Looking ahead, the 37th ISME World Conference is scheduled for July 25 - August 1, 2026, in Montreal, Canada, supported enthusiastically by local and national governments, universities, and colleges. We eagerly anticipate your participation!

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
