## 12 TIPS TO EXCEL IN YOUR WORK

High-quality conference abstract writing is a crucial skill to effectively communicate research, maximize the likelihood of acceptance, and ensure attendees understand the significance of your work [1-4]. The following twelve tips support the creation of a compelling abstract that meets international conference quality standards and captures the attention of your peers.



Writing a successful conference abstract is more challenging than it may seem, demanding discipline and rigor in determining essential information for a concise yet accurate presentation. Adherence to abstract submission guidelines significantly enhances the likelihood of acceptance. With experience, the process gets simpler. As a last piece of advice: avoid waiting until the last day of the deadline to submit your work!
