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What is the Entry/Exit System?



Automated large scale IT system



Registers third-country nationals travelling for a short stay (visa and visa-free)



Applies at the external borders




Replaces passport stamping with electronic records




Records entry refusals





How does the EES work?

The traveller must present their travel documents to the border guard and...







The border guard checks the traveller's information, asks questions, and digitally records the entry in the EES



The traveller benefits from a smoother and more efficient border crossing process

Objective and purpose of the progressive start



Facilitate EES operationalisation by giving Member States **the option** to deploy the system progressively at their external borders.



Replace the 'big-bang' start of operations with a progressive start for a smoother transition, while allowing MS to start fully from Day 1.



What does the **progressive start** mean?

Over 180 days, Member States will progressively:



deploy the EES across their BCPs (air, land, sea), in phases;

Member States can start the EES fully from Day 1.



introduce biometric functionalities across their BCPs;



record all third-country nationals in the scope of the EES.

Possibility for MS to suspend the EES in exceptional circumstances

By the end of 180 days period, the EES shall be fully used in <u>all BCPs</u> and <u>all travellers</u> shall be recorded
