Whisky: Scotland is famous for the production of Scotch whisky and has many distilleries to visit. Craft gins and beers are also now popular.



History: Scotland's long history has given rise to many castles, abbeys, stately homes, battle sites and other historic landmarks to visit.



Cuisine: Modern Scottish cuisine features a variety of top-quality produce, including seafood, beef, lamb, venison, as well as many different sweet options

Music: Scotland is traditionally associated with bagpipes and folk music, but also has a diverse and thriving modern music scene, particularly in the cities.

Literature: Many famous authors, poets and playwrights have come from Scotland, including Robert Burns, Walter Scott, Robert Louis Stevenson, and more recently Irvine Welsh and Ian Rankin.
