



Case Study – Equitable and open communication in global health research teams

In a global health project a graduate student from the Global South related to a local investigator how local healthworkers and lab techs on the study were becoming anxious and had begun to seek new positions when they overheard senior Global North researchers express concerns about funding that would pay their salaries being exhausted. Local lab workers and techs were not directly addressed about the issues and did not feel part of the team enough to raise their concerns openly. Instead they were considering quitting the project

Assumptions and dehumanizing practices in global health research

Not communicating,

Failure to understand research funded positions in research projects are precarious jobs in precarious environments

Assuming that local peoples' views do not need to be taken in account and people to not have the agency to participate in decision making.



DECOLONIAL FRAMEWORK

- **ACCOUNTABILITY** in context
- Consider relative **POSITIONALITY** and privilege
- Dynamic collaborative
- **ITERATIVE ETHICS** – not just ethics before and after research but **reflexively** throughout the process
- Researcher **REFLEXIVITY**




